Reading for Pleasure

Reading allows us to be transported from our own world to another. Between the pages of a book, we can become immersed in the lives of fictional characters and learn about a culture entirely different from our own. We can also learn new words and phrases, experience a range of emotions, and acquire skills and knowledge. Because of the learning potential, the effects of reading on child development are vast and multiple studies have highlighted its benefits. As part of our Enjoying Learning Together at Home ethos we ask that you share books: encourage your children to read and discuss books, read to them and discuss vocabulary, punctuation and probe for understanding. Enjoy them together. The importance of reading for children cannot be underestimated. Reading for pleasure can benefit a child's education, social and cognitive development, their wellbeing, and their mental health.

Apples

Our favourite book in Apples is The Book With No Pictures by B Novak. Arthur brought it to school on World Book Day and we have had repeated readings since - some children have even been inspired to write their own books with no pictures!

Pears

This week we have enjoyed reading The Tin Forest by Helen Ward and Wayne Anderson. This story is linked to our We Are Artists topic on recycling. We enjoyed this story because the old man lives in a world full of rubbish, but then he decides to recycle the litter to create a wonderful 'tin forest'. It reminded us of all the sculptures we made last term out of recycled materials.

Busy Bees

This half term we have introduced a 'Book Swap Box' into Busy Bees to encourage children to share and enjoy reading books for pleasure. We are slowly building up the amount of books and if anyone has any books they no longer want for ages 7-10 then please drop them into school. The children were very excited this week to swap books and share their thoughts on why they enjoyed the book. In class, we are also enjoying a range of books as part of Whole Class Guided Reading sessions. At the moment we are using our VIPERS skills to read about and enjoy the miraculous journey of Edward Tulane (a china rabbit). We are also reading the Iron Man to inspire our creative writing in English.
