

School Lunches: Price Increase

Over the years we have tried to avoid the need to regularly increase the cost of school lunches despite numerous increases in costs. The delivery of school meals is subsidised by schools and with further increases to the National Living Wage and National Insurance Contributions, along with the cost of supplies continuing to rise, we have had to make the decision to increase the cost of lunches from September 2025. The cost of a school lunch will rise to £2.85 per day (£14.25 per week). Whilst this increase does not cover the subsidy for school, it will keep it from rising to a point that will impact other areas of the school budget.

Children in Reception, Year 1 and Year 2 will still benefit from the governments universal free school meal. Although this is not means-tested, if you do qualify for any financial support shown below, we would encourage you to complete our online form as this could enable your child's school to claim the Pupil Premium Funding to further support them.

The Government also offer all children the opportunity to benefit from a free school meal if parents are in receipt of any of the following benefits:

• Universal Credit - if you apply on or after 1 April 2018 your household income must be less than £7,400 a year (after tax and not including any benefits you get)

- Income Support
- Income-based Jobseeker's Allowance
- Income-related Employment and Support Allowance
- support under part six of the Immigration and Asylum Act 1999
- the guaranteed element of Pension Credit
- Child Tax Credit, provided you are also not entitled to Working Tax Credit and have an annual household gross income that does not exceed £16,190
- Working Tax Credit run-on, paid for four weeks after you stop qualifying for Working Tax Credit

If your child is eligible for and receiving free school meals currently, this will continue.

Whole School Gardening

This year we have introduce a new whole school gardening curriculum, where all children are involved in Growing, Nurturing and Harvesting plants. The Apples children have been growing beans and peas. The Pears children have been planting garlic and onion. The Busy Bees children have been planting courgettes, turnips and pumpkins. The Tigers children have been planting chard and radishes. The 'Head Gardeners' (gardening club) have also grown rhubarb, nasturtium, lettuce, strawberries, sweet peas and tomatoes. We have already harvested some of our plants and Emma, our cook, has then used them in the children's meals at lunch time. Watch out for some of the lettuce at the big picnic. The classes have also taken part in an exciting 'Grow Your Own Potatoes' competition where they learnt about chitting, planting, growing and harvesting potatoes. We then had an exciting time weighing them to see who had produced the most amount of potatoes. Once again, Emma used them for a couple of roast dinner over the past two weeks. We look forward to continuing to harvest and grow many more plants next year!
